



The Story of Osiris

Seth believed that he should be king, because he was the strongest of the children of Nout. He was furious that both his sisters loved Osiris more than they did him. In his heart Seth plotted to kill Osiris and become king.

Osiris often walked through Egypt to see that everything was going well in his kingdom. Seth followed him. One day he caught Osiris alone on the river bank. Seth spat fury at his brother: the strong arm of Seth seized Osiris. Seth struck down his brother.

Some say that Seth held Osiris under the Nile until he drowned. Others say that Seth took the form of a wild bull and trampled Osiris to death. Even that was not enough for Seth. He tore the body of his brother apart and scattered the pieces. Seth wanted to make sure that even the magic of Isis could not bring Osiris back to life.

When Osiris didn't return to the palace, Isis knew that something terrible had happened. She and her sister Nephthys searched the deserts and the marshes and the river valley. On the bank of the Nile, Isis found the head of Osiris. It took twelve days to gather all the pieces of the body together. In despair, Isis called for the jackal god,

In despair, Isis caned for deadly Anubis, to help her: he is the deadly guardian of all graveyards.

Anubis laid the mangled body of Osiris on a bed. Isis and Anubis worked together to make the body whole again. Then Anubis cut open the stomach of Osiris with a flint knife. He reached inside and drew out the soft organs. He put the lungs and the liver, the stomach and the intestines of Osiris into four jars. Anubis washed the body with wine and covered it with natron salts to preserve it.

After forty days the skin was dried out by the salt. Anubis washed away the salt with Nile water. He packed the stomach with frankincense and myrrh and sewed up the wound. Anubis wrapped the head and limbs and torso in fine linen bandages.

Our first lesson will take place on FRIDAY 1st MAY 2020 at 1:00pm. We will hold the session for around an hour so that we have enough time to build. The more there are of us, the quicker it should be to build!



During the hour, the aim of the session will be to build a classroom treehouse! A random lesson to begin with but one that should be fun – it also links to our last topic 'The Good Life'!

For those of you who haven't used Minecraft on the PC/laptop, you use a mouse or mouse pad to look around and the letters W, A, S, D on the keyboard to move forward, back, left and right.

From there we will learn how to operate the software together – I know a lot about Minecraft however I am certain that you guys could teach me a thing or two!

To join the session, you will need a 4-symbol code which I will be posting on the Year 5_6 Twitter account (@williamstown5_6) at 1:00pm Friday. Press the play button on Minecraft, then select 'Join World', enter the code and you should be sent to the world I will have set up! My username will be 'DS' so you know which avatar is me!
